Jonathan Downing Middleton, 1807-1853, third child of John and Elizabeth Downing-Middleton, was born May 15, 1807, in Franklin County, Ohio. On Feb. 21, 1828, he was married in Franklij County, Ohio, by John F. Solomon to Margaretha Davis, born Feb. 4, $1809_{A}$ who lived with the Downings when they operated a tavern near Cglumbus, Ohio. Uncle Jonathan always told how he could span her waist with his hands when they were married because she was so very slender. However, at the time of her death she was a very large woman.

Jonathan was one of the three children who came to Elkh 其t County in the spring of 1829 to put in the crops and harvest them. His wife came with him to help Aunt Mary with the work. During the migration of the entire Middleton and Downing families in the spring of 1830 the oxen team of Jonathan's bolted at the sight of water ahead and as they ran toward the pond the family cupboard was jolted out of the wagon. This old battered cupboard is still in the possession of Priscilla Spahr, Plymouth, Ind., the sixth child of Jonathan.

Aunt Margaret, was bothered by the Indians as were all the pioneer women, but she would set up a pole with a white rag tied to it as soon as she saw the Indians coming. The men, seeing this, would come in from the field and the Indians would leave because they were afraid of the white men.

When a young man, Jonathan lost his health, although he still farmed and settled at Hog Creek, LaPorte County, Indiana. He contracted spotted fever, a form of malaria, which gradually weakened his vitality. In later years he moved back to Two Mile Plain, Elkhart County, where he starved himself to death, for he refused to eat and when relatives put food into his mouth he blew it out. It was a gradual separation of body and soul. He died Jan. 25, 1853, and is the only one of the original thirteen children to be buried in the Middleton Cemetery on the banks of the St. Joe Biver, Elkhart County, Indiana.

After Jonathan's death, Aunt Margaret sold parcels from a section of land near Elkhart which she had inherited. She did this, from time to time, in order to support her family. In 1866 she moved to Plymouth, Ind., where her son had gone in 1864 to obtain some cheaper land. She bought lot 12 in Plymouth

Apr. 30, 1866, as shown in deed book V, page 48. Her death occurred Dec. 29, 1891, and she is buried at Plymouth, Ind. Issue:

William Middleton, 1809-1861, the fourth child of John Middleton and Elizabeth Downing-Middleton, was born in Franklin County, Ohio, May 16, 1809. In 1833 he married Rebecea Gilliam born Sept. 13, 1814. She died Sept. 15, 1889, at Elkhart, Ind., and is buried on John Wesley Middleton's lot.

Aunt Rebecea was a small, dark, black-eyed woman who looked on the bright side of life and was a favorite aunt among her nieces and nephews. She entertained them with stories of early pioneer and Indian life.

Unele William was a carpenter by trade, but kept a tavern between Elkhart and South Bend known as the Halfway House. He also blacksmithed and was well beloved by the Indians for he helped them make their tools and weapons for farming and hunting. He died May 8, 1861, at Hartford, Iowa, and is buried there.

## WESTWARD TRECK OF THE DOUGLAS'S

In the spring of $\mathbf{1 8 7 5}$ our parents-J. R. and Mary Ellen Douglas-decided to treck to Colorado. Leaving Indianola, Iowa, early in the spring we reached Council Bluffs about the first of May. The trip up to this point was rather
nneventful, a lame horse, a broken wagon wheel with plenty of mud and disagreeable weather, all went as part of the routine.

At Council Bluffs we were halted for a week, waiting for other venturesome spirits who were headed westward. The danger from Indians was too real, too imminent, so the Government guards halted all travelers for the west until at least one hundred wagons were-congregated. About the middle of May we were again permitted to turn our faces westward, and now began the real journey. One hundred and four wagons with twenty or more horsemen and a herd of about a hundred cattle and some extra horses, made up the caravan. Brother Emery rode a little mule whenever it was safe for him to do so, assisting in the care of the cattle. Although he was only eight years of age he felt quite important and I suppose got more thrill out of the trip than any of the rest of us.

Heavy rains had swollen the rivers, so that when we reached the Loup, which we must cross, we found the ferry had been washed away and it was necessary for us to halt again for several days while a new ferry was built. Finally across and on our way once more there was constant uneasiness on account of the Sioux Indians, who were on the "war path." Near Old Fort Kearney we were again forced to stop for about a week, by Federal troops, on account of the Sioux War. The soldiers had a large band (two or three hundred) of Pawnee Indians who they were protecting from the Sioux. The camp was very interesting. No one of the travelers had ever seen so many Indians at one time, and to the young folks, especially, the Indians and soldiers wero a constant source of interest and entertainment.

The immediate danger of Indians being over, we were permitted to again pursue our journey.

In western Nebraska, far from any habitation, we saw an old man sitting at the door of a dugout. He either was half crazy or acted so. Rumor had it that he was a scout for a band of horse thieves. Thereafter for a few nights extra guards were posted.

At times along the way we were forced to wait for an hour or more to permit the passing of a large herd of buffalo. Every day antelope were seen grazing near our trail ; the prairie dogs with their saucy bark, and their neighbor, the prairie owl, were a never failing source of amusement.

We came in sight of Pike's Peak on July 4th, and reached Greeley, our destination, about the middle of July, 1875, after more than eight weeks of pleasure, hardship, danger, excitement, joy and sorrow all intermingled. 'Twas a trip never to be forgotten by those who participated.

## CHAPTER VII


#### Abstract

John Downing Middleton, 1811-1887, the fifth child of John Middleton and Elizabeth Downing-Middleton, was born in Franklin County, Ohio, May 4, 1811. His schooling consisted of reading the Testament and studying a spelling book. Thus he became a good speller but never learned to read. On March 13, 1833, he was married to Harrietta Smith Johnsten by George M. Beswick, minister of the Gospel, Elkhart, Ind.

Uncle John was a very good business man, trading in horses and grains, and always to his advantage. He never would live in rented property and prided himself in owning good farms wherever he migrated. He was a typical wanderlust; as soon as the community in which he was living became populated he would sell out and move to another frontier, doing the same thing again in a few more years. The first land John bought was eighty acres in LaPorte County, Indiana, for which he paid $\$ 240$ on Oct. 10, 1845. The following Feb. 14, 1846, he sold it for $\$ 400$. In the spring of 1846 he moved his family by oxen team to porthwest of Madison, Wis., on the shores of Lake Mendota, and later entered 160 acres of land by telegraph from Milwankee, one hundred miles away. When he returned he brought with him a load of material with which to build his home. Before this time their home consisted of a rail pen with brush on top for a roof. While John was on this trip to Milwaukee a cow strayed from home. Aunt Harriet hunted three days for it and during this time kept her children in a rail pen to protect them from the wolves and other wild animals. In the fall of 1867 Uncle John and his family left Madison, Wis., intending to migrate to Missouri, but when they stopped at Aunt Liza and Uncle Jim Settle's home near Knoxville, Iowa, they were persuaded to settle in Iowa. They bought land near Stuart, Iowa, where they lived until 1880 when they moved to Parkston, So. Dak. John journeyed many times during his lifetime to visit his relatives in Indiana and Missouri. These trips were always taken with a span of ponies hitched to a cart. He died in Parkston, So. Dak., Sept. 19, 1889, and is buried at Milltown, So. Dak.

Harrietta Smith Johnsten was born in Ohio Mar. 4, 1815, the youngest never spoke of them. She was a slender, dark complexioned woman with shiny, black, wavy hair; was very business like, economical, and had a quick temper. During her lifetime she was a tireless and rapid worker. With her children's help she sheared the sheep, washed and carded the wool, spun yarn and made all her children's clothing until they were grown. She was a very happy person singing about her work, but was also very superstitious, claiming she saw witches. However, her comment was, "You can't kill witches unless you have a silver bullet." She returned to Elkhart several times to visit relatives, but died at Milltown, So. Dak., June 21, 1891.
