 -Damiel Webster.Nancy Jane Middleton, 1823-1908, the twelfth child of John Middleton and Elizabeth Downing-Middleton, was born June 29, 1823, in Franklin Co., Ohio. She was married in the evening of Apr. 10, 1846, by Corbly Martin, preacher of the gospel, to Richard Cross Lake born Mar. 27, 1815, in Monongahela Co., W. Va., son of Nimrod Lake. They hewed a $\log$ cabin of one room and occupied it as soon as the roof was on and before the space between the logs had been chinked. A quilt hung in the doorway for some weeks as a door. A Dutch oven was their main cooking utensil.

Uncle Rich Lake came overland in 40 days from West Virginia in 1837. He was a good farmer, kept fine horses and stock, and was a successful trader. He was a very great home lover, going to bed early and arising early. Absolute quiet was an essential in his home, for his acute hearing led him to say he could hear a whisper through a partition. Uncle Lake was always ready to help in any civic work and was a friend to the poor. He gave the land site and $\$ 100$ for the Brethren Church building, worked on the building himself, and boarded the other workers free. As long as he lived he was a deacon of this Indian Creek Brethren Chureh. When the minister came for Sunday services or revivals' he and his helpers always stayed at the Lake home. A neighborhood cemetery was bought and plotted off by Uncle Rich and two neighbor men. He served as one of the trustees until his death and he and Aunt Nancy are both buried there.

Unele Rieh was ill a long time with typhoid fever. He was very much concerned prior to death with his wife's welfare. On his deathbed he told her to stay with Richard Jr. and his wife, Emma. "They will be good to you," he said. He left 320 acres of land, some of which has always been in the Lake name. He died July 26, 1898.

A grand-niece who spent some time in the Lake home when a child, writes an account which deseribes her enjoyment there.

## UNCLE RICHARD LAKE'S GARRET

"The garret of the big old colonial was a childhood haven to me. It was very large and high enough for a grown person to walk about easily. Jennie Lake, Unele Rich's granddaughter, and I used to play in that garret. Many times
when we were children about eight years old. The garret was full of worlds of the most interesting things to entertain children; the old spinning wheel (a large one), chests and trunks full of old clothes, hats, swords, hoops, bustles and such. The rafters were hanging full of bunches of sage, thyme, smartweed, catnip, hops, sassafras, and many other herbs used in those days. Bags of popcorn, dried sweet corn, dried apples; great baskets and boxes of walnuts, chestnuts, hickory and hazel nuts; pieces of old discarded chairs and furniture; old books and slates; bundles of gorgeous peafowl feathers, bags of goòse feathers, baskets of carpet rags, wonderful patch work quilts, hand carding mats, and a myriad of other things that helped to make the garret a wonderland to me.

## CHAPTER XIV

Elizabeth Ann Middleton, 1826-1912, the thirteenth and youngest child of John Middleton and Elizabeth Downing-Middleton, was born in Franklin Co., Ohio, Feb. 9,1826 . She was tenderly reared by her older sisters when the family lived on the banks of the Little Sciot6 River five miles northwest of Columbus, Ohio. During those struggling pioneer days the older sisters did the family washing in the river. Little Betsy Ann would go down to the river and watch her sisters wash. When the laundry work was finished they would take Betsy Ann for a ride in the washtub, wading and pulling the tub behind them. When four years old the youngest Middleton child met with an accident, the marks of which she carried to her grave. Aunt Mary Stotts was living with her parents at the Inn when her first child was born. Betsy Ann was very much interested in the new baby and slipping away from her mother one afternoon she climbed the stairs to see the child. As she was coming down the stairs she slipped and broke her collarbone. From that day on she always wore a pad on her shoulder to fill out her dress over the improperly set bone.

Betsy Ann learned to read with the help of her mother, who was well educated. While Elizabeth Downing was spinning Betsy Ann would bring the many old story papers her mother had saved and read aloud from them. When she came to an unfamiliar word she would spell it to her mother who would pronounce it for her. Thus she became a very good oral reader. She was also very adept at numbers.

Elizabeth Ann had the shiny black hair typical of her family. She was also the exact picture of her mother. One glance at the picture of the five sisters will acquaint one with the ancestral mother, Elizabeth Downing, through her youngest child.

After the death of her mother Elizabeth Ann kept house for her father until his death. She inherited part, of her mother's personal belongings which included a chest containing a dress, a teapot and sugarbowl in mulberry color designs,
a Japanese pitcher with brown designs, a plate, a Paul Revere Lantern, and a man's German silver folding pooket comb.

On March 16, 1848, Mlivedeth Am was married to Miehael Mitchel, born Jan. 24, 1820, in New Berlin Co., Pa. They bought a farm east of the old Mifiadleton homestead, five miles east of Elkhart. It was situated on the south bank of the St. Joe River just east of where Pine Oreek empties into the siver and west of what is known as the six span bridge. Uncle Mike built a large rambling house set back among the forest 'trees and lived and died on this farm. He was always a favorite uncle; was hospitable, liked young people and created a congenial atmosphere for visitors. When the Civil War soldiers veturned, especially those from the Andersonville Prison, he did much to make them comfortable. He was a stout man and became such a progressive farmer that his farm was a showplace for people from miles around. He was the first farmer in Ellzhart County to use machinery as labor saving devices.

## CHRISTMMAS AT UNCLLE MIKE MITCHEL'S

It was the year 1879 when Mary Ellen Middleton Douglas and her children, Emery and Elma, were visiting the relatives in Ellthart, Ind. They were spending the week before Christmas at Uncle Mike's out at the farm on the St. Joseph River.

Aunt Lib Mitchel ana Mary Ellen Douglas had planned on going to town to do some shopping, but before they were able to start, there came the big smow storm of the year and the roads were completely blocked. In those days elearing a road of heavy snow was a matter of days and much hard labor, so the prospects of a jolly Christmas were very little.

The two mothers, both women of great courage and resourcefulness, planned a splendid surprise for the four children, Will and Dora Mitchel, Emery and Elma Douglas. Will and Emery waded out into the woods and returned with a beautiful little Christmas tree which was set up in the parlor but further than that, the ehildren knew nothing of what was going on behind those closed doots.

After supper on Christmas Eve, the parlor was opened and all rushed in eager to see what had been going on in there. What a grand surprise when the sight met their eyes! There astood the tree wonderfully decorated, for Aunt Lib had made a lot of cookies cut out in the shape of various amimals-horses, cows, pigs, sheep, and chickens. These were hang on the tree as were also strings of popeorn. Mary Fllen Douglas had made some decorations for the tree out of bits of edolored paper. Bright red and yellow apples 'helped to give color to the sceñe.

Ifter the chillaren had exjoyed the tree, goot their animal cookies and a bag of homemadecsamdy, they had rgesett spoit compasing animule aind playing games,

A large basket of apples, a pan of popeorn, a basket of walnuts, hickory, hazel and chestnuts; and a jug of sweet cider provided ample refreshments. Aunt Lib told the boys that she thought they wanted to be farmers so she was giving them a start in livestbek.

So, in spite of the storm, they had a wonderful, jolly Christmas, that was most enjoyable and satisfying to all in that party composed of Uncle Mike, Aunt Lib, Will Mitchel, Dora Mitchel-Light, Mary Ellen Middleton-Douglas with her children Elma (Midge) Douglas-Smith, Emery Douglas, and Daniel Smith, a friend of the family.

In 1856 Uncle Mike was responsible for the placing of a tombstone on the grave of Uncle Charley Minear in the Middleton Cemetery. Uncle Mike died Sept. 10, 1890.

Aunt Libby Mitchel was a great lover of flowers and always raised many beautiful ones. People came to her for flowers for weddings and funerals such as they do to a florist today. She was also very hospitable, keeping on hand always a supply of cakes and fruit for hungry visitors. In her later years she was afflicted with cataract on the eyes, but was somewhat relieved by helpful treatment. $\sim$ She was a most picturesque and distinguished figure at the annual Middleton reunions. She died Jan. 9, 1912, at the home of her youngest daughter, Eudora Light, and is buried in Rowe Cemetery beside her husband.
